
CANADA'S GOVERNMENT

 The Constitution Act of 1867 was the first PLAN of government for the nation of Canada.

 It is the plan that would describe what KIND of government Canada would have.



This act described what DUTIES would belong to the federal government and which would belong to the provincial and territorial governments





 It also said that all Canadians had complete FREEDOM.


 The men who wrote this act are called the FATHERS OF CONFEDERATION.

•And finally, it is known as the Supreme Law of Canada and includes some 30 acts and orders.



 It explains the RIGHTS of each Canadian citizen.




CANADIAN CHARTER OF RIGHTS AND FREEDOMS

- These rights include...
 - Freedom of choice and religion
 - Freedom of speech, expression and thought
 - The freedom to meet peacefully with other people
 - The right to vote
 - The right to be treated equally by the government regardless of age, sex, race, ethic origin or mental or physical disability

WHAT TYPE OF GOVERNMENT DOES CANADA HAVE?

- Canada is a constitutional monarchy.
- That means they recognize the Queen/King as the Head of State, but the Prime Minister is the Head of Government.



THE THREE BRANCHES



 Like the USA, Canada's government is divided into three branches:

- The Executive Branch
- The Legislative Branch
- The Judicial Branch

THE THREE BRANCHES

 The Constitution Act of 1867 describes the duties that each branch has.

 Each branch must follow the Constitution at all times.



THE THREE BRANCHES

- The headquarters for each branch is in Ottawa, Ontario which is Canada's national capital.
- Where is the headquarters for the government of the USA?



THE EXECUTIVE BRANCH

- This branch makes sure the laws are OBEYED.
- The head of this branch is the Prime Minister, who has a Cabinet to assist him/her.
- Stephen Harper is Canada's Prime Minister today.



THE EXECUTIVE BRANCH

 The head of Canadian government is the Prime Minister.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL

- Canada's Monarch (king or queen) is also Monarch of 15 other nations.
- Canada's Monarch, with the advice of the Prime Minister, appoints someone to represent the Monarch in Canada.
- This is the Governor General.



THE GOVERNOR GENERAL

- The Governor General serves as the Commander in Chief of the Canadian Armed Forces.
- The Governor General also celebrates excellence by giving awards to outstanding Canadians.
- They also host foreign leaders and visit foreign countries at the request of the Prime Minister.





 This branch is in charge of making laws.




 It is known as Parliament, the equivalent of Congress in the USA.

Parliament is made up of the House of Commons and the Senate.




• The Senate...

- Is the UPPER house.
- Numbers are based on Canada's population.
- The Prime Minister selects senators.
 Since they are not elected, they have little power.



• The House of Commons...

- Is the LOWER house and is the most important part of the Legislative Branch.
- The members are known as Members of Parliament (MP's) and their job is to make and pass laws.

- The highest court in this branch is the Supreme Court, made up of 9 justices.
- These justices are appointed by the Governor General.
